Introduction from Jason Elsom



e are proud to present the UK's largest annual poll of parents, and our biggest yet. Our work with YouGov addresses many tough and highly topical matters facing parents in 2025. We look at their

views, hopes, struggles and fears. This report presents the results from the 865 parents in Wales.

This year we have sought parents' views on the additional learning needs crisis, crime and their children's safety, their own loneliness, their children's happiness, behaviour, discipline and much more.

Our aim is to provide clarity to policymakers, researchers and those supporting parents through the challenges they face. The National Parent Survey is a call to action for governments across the nations to help parents as they do the most important job any of us will ever do.

Children spend the vast majority of their childhood outside of a classroom, but we spend very little time talking about what happens beyond the school gates. That's where Parentkind comes in.

As the largest parent charity in the UK, we work with over 14,000 parent groups and almost 200,000 parent volunteers who support other parents and children, strengthen communities and build relationships - all while raising almost £140 million a year for schools. If a school has a parent group supporting it, it is likely they are part of the Parentkind community.

We hope that you will find this report incredibly useful, but I encourage you to go further to explore the wealth of additional data from the YouGov survey available at

The website includes the UK report, which is based on the views of 5,866 parents from across the four nations. There you can examine the views of parents by nation, region, type of school, family income, relationship status, age of child, phase of education, gender of parent or child and more.

At Parentkind, we never pit parents against teachers. There is no them and us - most teachers are parents themselves and know the difference they can make. We need to get serious about the role of parents in schools and their role in raising children, from birth right through to the teenage years. That's why we publish the National Parent Survey.

The data in the National Parent Survey should spark debate. It should make parents part of our conversation and part of the solution to many of the challenges facing society today.















































? To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements in relation to RSE?









What we should do in response to the National Parent Survey 2025...

Too many children don't feel safe at school

Too many children don't feel safe at school, and we know this is mostly due to a bullying crisis documented in this year's National Parent Survey.

School inspectorates should always measure whether children feel safe at school and report back on the results. Where children regularly feel unsafe, this should be a cause for concern.

The Cabinet Secretary for Education should work towards a national snapshot of bullying in schools so we know the full extent of how many children are being bullied and to shine a spotlight on this awful experience for too many children.

Banning smartphones in school has been shown to reduce bullying and improve behaviour. If we want to tackle bullying, we need to introduce a clear and unambiguous ban on smartphones in schools.

Children should enjoy school

Being happy at school should be an expectation for every child.

We need a new national measure of how happy children are at school and roll out school-level data tracking tools that allow headteachers and school inspectorates to monitor how happy children are at school. Give children their independence by banning smartphones and social media

We need to give children their childhood back.

This means a national effort to remove smartphones from children and help them reacclimatise to real life. The UK urgently needs to become a world leader in removing access to social media and smartphones for our children and help them rediscover the world on their doorstep.

Reimagined PTAs can tackle parent loneliness and provide help to parents

Parenting is hard and parents tell us they feel isolated and lonely.

There is an important role for Parent Teacher Associations (PTAs) to play in helping bring parents together to talk about parenting and the challenges all parents face. PTAs are more than fundraising bodies.

The Pupil Level Annual School Census (PLASC) should be amended to include a question on PTAs to establish how many schools have a PTA group.

5 Parents need to model responsible smartphone behaviour

We need to ban smartphones for children, but parents need to model good behaviour.

Parents need to think carefully about the message compulsive scrolling and time spent staring at smartphones sends to children.

We need a national campaign to nudge behaviour and help parents understand the dangers of displaying obsessive smartphone behaviour when children are nearby.

6 Laptops and tablets are the new school cost worry for parents

It isn't just school uniform that is a worry for parents, technology is increasingly a big concern. A third of children are required to have a laptop or tablet for school, which is a major cost worry for parents.

The Cabinet Secretary for Education should commission an urgent review to establish exactly what technology is required by schools and how much this is costing parents.





It is time to rethink the school holiday calendar

Teaching is tough and physically draining, but the six-week summer holiday is out of date.

We need to make sure teachers get the time off they need, but our school holiday calendar is out of date and out of sync with the expectations of parents.

The Welsh Government should take another look at rebalancing the school year following last year's consultation on the topic and in light of the polling in this survey, which shows more parents support a reduction of the summer holiday from six weeks to four weeks than oppose it.





Supporting parents worried about Relationships and Sexuality Education

Transparency should be an expectation when it comes to 'sex ed' and Relationships and Sexuality Education, and parents with concerns should always be listened to.

We know that when schools get this right, parents are much more likely to understand and support what is being taught in class.

We should look again at how we can improve transparency and communication between home and school to make sure every parent is heard and no parent has to send their child into a class they are uncomfortable with.

Methodology

The National Parent Survey was conducted online by YouGov. The fieldwork took place from 27th March to 18th April 2025 amongst 5,866 parents in England (3,391), Scotland (1,309), Wales (865) and Northern Ireland (301), who have at least one child aged 4 to 18 in school. If respondents have more than one child, parents are asked to answer all the questions with their oldest child who currently attends school/college in mind. The charts in this report show the results for parents in Wales. The figures have been weighted and are representative of all parents in Wales.

All figures, unless otherwise stated, are from YouGov plc. Analysis and reporting was carried out by Parentkind.

Unless otherwise noted, all percentages on the charts/graphics are rounded to the nearest whole number.

Margin of error

As the survey is not polling the entire population of parents in Wales, but rather a sample of the population, results are subject to a margin of error which is estimated to be \pm -3.3 percentage points for the whole sample. The exact margin of error varies with the proportion considered. This means that if, for instance, according to the survey 14% of respondents say that their child is always happy at school, in reality the proportion is likely to be between 10.7% and 17.3% (i.e. the margin of error would be \pm -3.3%). Some of the statistically significant differences in results for particular demographic subgroups are mentioned in this summary.
